
Primary Elections May 3rd VOTERS MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Signs are popping up all over Pike Township in anticipation of the May 3rd primary elections. What are the rules for sign placement, and who is running?

So many signs and some properties have over a dozen political signs placed along the road declaring allegiance to candidates of choice and asking you for your vote on May 3. Some of these include candidates for Senate and Legislative seats, Marion County Assessor, Auditor, Circuit Court Judge, Clerk, Prosecutor, Recorder, and Sheriff. Pike Township only races include a Trustee and Constable.

What are rules regulating the placement of signs? The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) sent out a reminder that "under Indiana Code 9-21-4-6 campaign signs are prohibited from being placed in federal and state highway rights-of-way." In Marion County, sign regulations bar placement of any sign in a public right-of-way. However, check Homeowners As-



sociations rules. Typically, HOA's cannot prohibit residents from displaying opinion yard signs as long as they do not obstruct traffic, are not attached to utility poles, and are not in a public right-of-way. Signs are also limited in Marion County to five per candidate, per specified road frontage and may not block site lines of traffic. What can I expect on voting day? Indiana has a "modified open" primary rule for elections, so while voters do not have to officially declare a party affiliation, you do have to choose a party ballot for voting. Several county offices and Pike Township offices have competitive races.

For Pike Democrats, there are five competitive races. This includes Trustee, where Claudette Peterson is

If you want to get out early to vote in Pike Township, the Pike Library has early voting hours. Early voting is also available until May 2 at the City County building. If you are someone

who thinks your vote doesn't matter, it's good to point out that local elections carry a lot of weight and depend on local citizens to elect their candidate of choice. Issues that are important to you locally can be impacted by your local officials, so voting is crucial to your voice being heard. The local primary elections are a perfect opportunity to make your vote count.

The prerequisites to vote in the primary follow: "Indiana residents must be registered to vote, have a valid Indiana driver's license or Indiana state identification card, be a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years old and

not currently imprisoned. A 17-year-old may register and vote in the primary election if the voter turns 18 on or before the next general election November 8, 2022 but may only vote for primary candidates and may not vote on public questions such as a school referendum seeking additional funding for local public schools. To check if you are registered and find your voting location go to the Indiana Voters Website: indianavoters.in.gov or Marion County: vote.indy.gov You can also find sample ballots for your address at these sites. Print them off, check your candidates, and head to the polls on May 3.



The Pyramids at College Park Has a **New Owner**

A PIKE TOWNSHIP LANDMARK IS BEING REDEVELOPED AND COLLEGE PARK SHOPS ADDED TO THE NORTHWEST SIDE.

Pike Township is home to the iconic Pyramids. The "Pyramids" at College park were constructed in 1967-1972 by College Life Insurance Company, now DBA Americo Life, Inc. The entire College Park business park constructed in the 1970's encompasses over 615 acres. The investor and visionary behind this business park was John W. Burkhart, owner of the College Life Insurance company, a Phi Kappa Psi member and founder of the Indianapolis Business Journal. Two other well-known civic leaders were instrumental in the plans and included Beurt Servaas, a real-estate developer and civic leader, Howard Peterson, father of former Mayor Bart Peterson. They envisioned

not only a business park, but a residential area, and of course, the college connection that would house a number national fraternity and sorority headquarters. This original community, business and residential park has shifted somewhat over the years, but the heart of education, philanthropy and innovation is still present. Over the years, the area was home to some pretty cool events. In the 90's, several hot air balloon races launched from the lakefront grassy area as thousands gathered to enjoy a sense of community, fun, and colorful balloon display.

The Pyramids Office Park is one of the most highly visible office parks in Indianapolis. Situated along Michigan Rd. and Interstate 465, it is located along a corridor that continues to see growth and new developments. "KennMar took advantage of a great opportunity to invest in the community by purchasing this landmark office park," said Kevin Gillihan, Senior Vice

President at JLL. "The Pyramids are home to some of Indy's most reputable businesses and KennMar's determination to redevelop areas within the city is something many of us are looking forward to. We are confident KennMar will make the most of this investment."

KennMar development company looks for opportunities revitalize neglected, deteriorating, or abandoned properties, and expand their use. By repurposing existing architecture, they hope to reduce the amount of demolition debris entering landfills and stimulate economic growth around redeveloped properties. Not only redevelopment, but new development at College Park Shops along Depauw Boulevard. The shops will house a Panera, Starbucks, retail and office space. The 10.5 acres include options for free standing multi-tenant spaces, restaurants, retail and office use. It's a high traffic location, visible to nearly 50,000 vehicles per day on Michigan Road and over 130,000 vehicles per day on I-465. The site location is ideal as College Park is seeing a revitalization and growth that seeks to incorporate amenities for tenants and visitors experience to relaxing and aesthetically surroundings. pleasing

Nearby amenities include over 1.8M SF of office and retail, including Costco, Target, Trader Joe's, Home Depot, McNamara's and At Home plus 50 restaurants. Just across the street, a professional, year-round theater performing Broadway and children's productions offers an intimate setting for the community to enjoy something different. Adding in walkable restaurants and other amenities to the area will be welcomed. With both KennMar and Equivis focused on building out a product that serves the community and its tenants, this could be a hub of activity.

A workforce housing option is another innovative space conversion. PEG Companies is planning a workforce community housing along Founders Road. PEG acquired the extended stay hotel and converted it to quality Class-B multifamily product with a residential option also planned. PEG Companies, is based near Provo, Utah and has much success in similar conversions of residence to work housing in dozens of locations across the U.S. Finally, adding to the good work in resiliency, is Keep Indianapolis Beautiful Inc., who recruited staff and volunteers in planting over 200 trees along the College Park streets in 2021. These replaced the hundreds lost to blight and the emerald ash borer. Stav tuned for updates as they become available, and share your stories of history about the Pyramids and College Park.

It's Deanna from Indiana

SPOTLIGHT ON THE OSCARS, GRAMMYS AND OUR LATEST PIKE HOMETOWN CELEBRITY

Last week, Deanna Dixon returned to Indiana and Pike Township to celebrate life with her family and friends. This, after a whirlwind week in early April, which included singing with Beyoncé at the Oscars, with John Legend at the Grammys, and a release of her own single "Healed" on her 38th Birthday. What more could an artist ask for in a week? Deanna said, "It's the journey unfolding in front of my eyes that is most exhilarating!"

Deanna graduated from Pike H.S. in 2002 and embraces her roots in Indiana when in-

troducing herself to others Deanna from Indiana. She reminds me that this phrase serves two purposes, to make sure people pronounce her name correctand celeto brate the people and famfrom her home

town that have supported her on the journey to success. The day I spoke with Deanna on the phone last week, she was sitting in her mother Christine Dixon's home in Indianapolis with her daughter Dakota on her lap. Three generations, mom, daughter, and granddaughter were planning for a family get together to celebrate success and each other. Deanna called this gathering, a "Framily BBQ." Held at her father Robert's home in Pike Township, her goal is to visit as many family members and friends as possible.

Deanna said her return to Indiana is both a beautiful and sad moment. Having been away for so long, she discovered recently, her 33 year old cousin is now in hospice, to receive care after a long, painful battle with cancer. Deanna said her cousin always wanted to sing and

Deanna hopes to share her music as a way to share hope and joy. Deanna said she believes in miracles and the healing power of music.

Deanna lived in Augusta Heights during high school and attended United Baptist Apostolic Church on Michigan Road. Her mother was the choir director and Deanna said, with warm

remembrance, how she lived, played, and sang both under and on the pews. Church was her second home and where she spent most of her time grow-



ing up. Singing was her life.

It was while attending Pike High School that she realized she could sing outside of church for fun. "The school was hosting a talent show called "Star Quest" and you had to have money to register. My mom has always been my biggest supporter and we went around Pike Township and the Crooked Creek area to all the neighborhoods. My mom helped me raise all the money to pay for the competition. My mom helped me sew my performance outfit and my brother helped with the music. My brother, who is also now a performer in Atlanta, also helped me. Back in the day, we were still using cassette tapes and he had to make his voice sound like God's, and we created storm sounds as part of my performance. I won that year and it reinforced an even deeper dream of singing to make a living and I went on to American Idol."

However, she reminded me, "the journey was long and had its share of ups and downs," but she's thankful for the sequence of events that added validity to this next chapter of her life. "When I was young, all I wanted was to sing. I knew growing up I planned on my voice and singing taking me around the world. Somewhere along the way, I allowed myself to stop be-

lieving. I said I need to be practical. I'm a mother and need to support my daughter. I told myself that being a singer couldn't afford me the life I wanted to live. So I kept trying to be practical and ignore this dream."

We talked about her travels to Los Angeles and the bold move to leave her job and follow her dream. She talked about believing in miracles. "I've been living in L.A. for the last 4 years, singing profession-ally with the Ke, (Kanye Sunday Service). During this tour, people kept saying, you should put out your own record, make a single of your own. The Sunday Service tours were keeping me afloat in L.A. Then when the pandemic came, it was a low point. Artists were not performing. I decided to take action, and began eating better and working out, to think about what my internal calling was, what it looks like artistically for me. I lost 45 pounds and got back to exercising. It was during one morning of workouts that I felt this inspiration, a song was welling up inside of me. I knew it was time to just step out in faith and follow my dreams."

"It was also, at this same time, I was contacted to do work for another artist as a backup singer. I knew it was something for the Oscars, but didn't know

with whom or what. During the taping, the director told us casually we would be working with Beyoncé! Let me tell you, Beyonce was the performer I looked up to, and this was just amazing. Beyoncé is one of my favorites and biggest influencers. I was asked after this performance what I do next to top this. I have to say that's when I go back to my own artistry. With Beyoncé we performed "Be Alive," a hit single for the movie King Richard, a movie about Venus and Serena Williams' relationship with their father. The movie "King Richard" was nominated for Best Picture and this taping would air at the Academy Awards. I couldn't tell anyone, not my family or

friends. kept iust saying, ``I'm doing something big, watch the Oscars to find out." The backdrop for the performance at the Oscars was taped prior to the show on a neon vellow tennis court in Compton, California and all

singthe ers, including Deanna, were decked out in bright neon yellow. Deanna said the performance was surreal, and the total effect wasn't evident until she saw it all pulled together during the March 27 Oscar's release. "It was my Disneyland of experiences, and I couldn't

tell anyone until the Oscars aired and the performance went live."

"Now this was just the beginning, working with Beyoncé gave me the needed finesse to adjust my video for my new single called "Healed." After seeing how her video came together it inspired me to raise the bar on my own video. Her work and seeing how everything was pulled together gave me insights into my own artistry. When we filmed for Beyoncé we had beads in our hair, it was touching and brought back memories of how I grew up, and how I like to wear these same types of beads."

"After the Academy Awards and filming my own video, I was asked to do back up for

John Legend at the Grammys. All of this was in a short week's span. It was amazing, how when I finally surrendered to my gifts, things began to fall into place. My single "Healed" was released just days later on April 3rd, my birthday."

While talking on the phone with Deanna, her six year old daughter Dakota and her mother sat nearby. "My mom Christine Dixon is a huge inspiration to my music.

I live by her words, "walk on water, by faith not sight." "My mom has worked in education and is also a very skilled painter and hosts paint parties. My daughter Dakota is also a painter because of her grandma." Dakota's giggles were infectious and I could hear the voice and laughter of a beautiful little soul as she shared her love of spending time with her uncles, grandand painting pa, with her grandma.

Deanna said her mother has been her strongest ally and encourager and you can support Deanna's work by supporting her mom. Follow her mother's painting party business, Creatively Christine LLC on Instagram. (creativelychristine66)

asked what the inspiration for the sin-gle, "Healed" was. "Talking to my brother and mom, I've had so ebbs manv and flows being a singer and in the music industry. So many times I've moved away from it. I was riding on my bike and the song came to me and I realized that everything I needed was already inside me and

that little girl still believed in her dream. This was so healing for me and my community and anybody who has given up on their dreams. Filled with a lot of rejection and failure and God had healed me and filled me." Deanna stressed throughout our conversation that family is everything to her, and her daughter will always come first in any work she does.

When asked if there is any chance she would ever come back to Indiana. Deanna said, "Before, if you asked me this, I would have a different answer. I almost came back at the end of last winter during the pandemic because family is everything to me. As long as I am afforded an opportunity to do

what I love I'll never say never."

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT ELIGIBILITY

The Pike Township Fire Department will be taking applications for the establishment

of a new hiring eligibility list. This list will then be used to hire firefighters for the next two years.

Have you dreamed of becoming a firefighter? Do you have a

passion for helping people and thrive in teamwork settings? We are seeking hardworking, dedicated men and women to become part of the PTFD family. The hiring process consists of three components:

- The written exam, covering basic math, reading, and comprehension skills, as well as memorization and recall.
 - 2. The physical fitness evaluation, which evaluates five components of fitness including cardiovascular endurance, muscular endurance, muscular strength, flexibility, and body composition. The goal of the fitness evaluation is to help select candidates that are capable of successfully performing all firefighting requirements.
- 3. The oral interview, which gives candidates an opportunity to answer a structured set of questions.

Additionally, all candidates must possess a current Candidate Physical Agility Test (CPAT) card.

Previous experience in the fire service is not required. If you are selected, you will go through a 5-month recruit academy where we will teach you everything you need to know from emergency medical skills to fire suppression.

Once you successfully complete the recruit academy, you will be assigned a work shift. Pike Township firefighters work a 24 hour on, 48 hours off schedule with a Kelly day every 3 weeks. One of the greatest parts of this job is that every day is different. You get to work as part of a cohesive team (family) to solve all different types of problems.

Requirements for application include:

- Age: 21 years old to be hired. You may apply prior to your 21st birthday but you cannot be hired until you have reached the age of 21.
- not 36 years old at time of appointment
- military veterans who have served 20 years with an honorable discharge and will not be older than 40 years 6 months at time of appointment.
- Education: High school diploma or GED
- İdentification: valid driver's license
- Background: No felony convictions that have not been expunged or sealed by a court
- Residence: Must be a US citizen and live within the state of Indiana.


